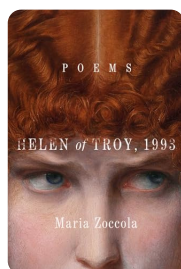

NEW YOUNG ADULT BOOKS



STAFF PICK: Emily WE ARE OKAY by Nina LaCour

We Are Okay is a beautifully written story, driven not by plot points but by memories and grief and love and loneliness. The book examines many different kinds of relationships: grandparent, grandchild, parent, child, friend, and beloved. The main character is so fragile and broken at the beginning of the story, it just breaks your heart. Have tissues ready! LaCour takes her time showing (not telling!) the reader how Marin has ended up where she's at. The ending doesn't wrap up in a perfect bow, and that's okay. Marin understands that she is forever changed by her loss and grief and the choices she has made. She still wants to continue on, risking the chance to be hurt again. This young adult book doesn't shy away from the difficulties of life and depression, but it ends with hope, which I think is something we all need to be reminded of every once in a while.

LIBRARY NEWS

FRIENDS OF THE LIBRARY USED BOOK SALE: The Friends are hosting their first used book sale of the year! Stop by our Community Room from April 3rd to 5th for a chance to take home some good books. The sale will run Thursday from 9am to 6pm, Friday from 9am to 5pm, and Saturday from 10am to 12pm.

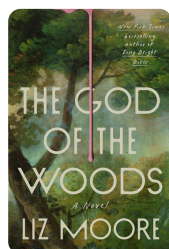
IN MICHIGAN, libraries are funded locally but certain statewide services are funded by federal money through the Institute of Museum and Library Services. The two big federally funded services our library depends on are:

- *Mel.org*. This is a collection of online databases available to any resident of the state of Michigan. It offers homework help, Michigan history, and test prep for people taking things like the ASVAB, just to name a few valuable services.
- *The Melcat*. Melcat is a statewide book sharing service that includes 435 libraries including public, school, business, university, and museum libraries. In 2024, CWPL circulated almost 18,000 items through Melcat. Across the state, around a million items were shared between libraries. Our library collection holds around 81,000 physical items. Through the Melcat, we can offer our patrons access to 34 million items.

On March 14, 2025, President Trump signed an executive order instructing that the budget and staffing of the Institute of Museum and Library Services be reduced to the minimum required by law. The Melcat and Mel.org are funded through September 2025. If you would like to support these services, you can contact your representatives and speak to them about what you perceive to be the value of these services and the IMLS.
